

• This refers to working in the local community sharing the gospel through various activities.

General Notes for the Visit

Arusha is a key city hub of life and business in northern Tanzania. By strengthening the congregations in Arusha, the Gospel will spread through the church in Tanzania and East Africa. Most people only walk, so they are trying to establish congregations at 1.5-mile intervals. Arusha is growing exponentially and many people come to Arusha on business and then go back to home villages, bringing the Gospel with them.

We will work with the Kisongo and Kwa Mrombo churches of Christ as well as other Arusha congregations to reach souls during the campaign. The local workers will have Bible studies set up for us prior to our arrival. When a person or family in Arusha has a Bible study with us (the church) for the 3rd time, they receive a Bible to keep. The Bible is extremely valuable to them because they likely do not have their own printed copy of God's Word. Children can read better than adults much of the time. Everyone who goes on the trip will conduct or help with the Bible studies.

There will be quite a bit of walking so bring some good walking shoes. Women will need to wear a long skirt or a Konga, which is a cloth wrapping. The dress code is due to cultural reasons. Men need to wear long pants. No suits are required. This dress code will need to be followed during Safari for Souls, worship, and any visits with locals. Please be considerate as we are in a foreign country and not in the United States; we wish to respect their customs and culture.

You will be staying in dorm-style rooms at the Andrew Connally School of Preaching. Each room has 2-4 beds. Bathrooms are shared between two rooms ("Jack and Jill" style bathrooms). There is a common microwave and a small refrigerator. The school has clean twin-mattress sheets. However, you can choose to bring new sheets and leave them as a donation if you would prefer. Your own pillowcase is nice. If you really need a certain pillow, you can pack it. The school has clean towels, but you can choose to bring your own and leave them if you would like.

General Information for U.S. Visitors to Tanzania

Travel Logistics

- Airline Ticket (Atlanta to Kilimanjaro or Nairobi): Expect a cost in the range of \$1,800 and upwards for economy class. Flights from other major cities in the eastern USA are usually in this same general price range. We generally try to find tickets that take us from Atlanta to Europe and then to Arusha or Nairobi. This can vary according to availability and costs. The rule of thumb is the earlier we book the cheaper the tickets will be.
- Passport: A valid passport is required for North American and European visitors to Tanzania. Make sure your passport expiration date extends beyond your expected date of departure from Tanzania. Otherwise, if your passport expires while in country, you will need to visit the embassy in Dar es Salaam for renewal. Before leaving on your trip, make a copy of your passport's photo page. Upon arrival you may want to store your original passport for safekeeping and carry your copy to use at police checkpoints, banks, etc.
- **Driver's License:** Purchase an international driver's license if you expect to be driving while in Tanzania. An international driver's license can be obtained from most AAA offices. *Remember, traffic in Tanzania travels on the left.*
- **Visa:** US citizens are required to have a Tanzanian visa before entering Tanzania. A visa can be purchased on arrival at Kilimanjaro International Airport. The cost is \$100 and must be paid in cash (new U.S. currency should be taken). You may also purchase a visa in advance from a visa service provider in the US or online.
- Immunizations (see checklist): Important immunizations will require an estimated budget of \$200 to \$300 for first time visitors to Africa. (Immunizations are optional but recommended). Consult the Center for Disease Control (CDC) website regarding immunization recommendations. Do not forget that your latest tetanus shot needs to be less than five years old. Record all immunizations in an immunization record booklet and carry it with your travel documents.
- **COVID:** Be sure to have the most up-to-date information on the required COVID testing before traveling and for the return flight.

WHAT TO BRING

- Your **Bible**.
- Valid **passport, visa** and **immunization record**. Check the expiration date on your passport so it does not expire while on your trip. Make a copy of your passport and while in Africa keep the passport in a safe place. Carry the copy with you for routine in country use.
- Good, small **flashlight** and extra **batteries**.
- **Medications** you might be taking or think you will need. Certain prescription meds may be hard to obtain in Tanzania. Bring enough prescription medicines to last your whole trip. Many medicines are available in local pharmacies but do not assume that your particular medicines will be available.

- Snack food such as snack crackers, candy, or anything you like to munch on. Bring any specialty food items if you have specific dietary needs. Some food items are difficult to find in local stores (gluten free foods, for example).
- Wet wipes and hand sanitizer are very highly recommended.
- Small overnight bag or backpack for day trips.
- **Jacket or sweater** if your trip is during the months of June August. During the day it will warm up enough to wear short sleeves. Remember that seasons in the southern hemisphere are reversed from those in the northern hemisphere. June through August is cooler, December through February is hot, and November through March is the rainy season.
- **Small umbrella** if your trip is during the months of November March.
- It is generally not culturally appropriate for women to wear pants in rural Tanzania, so females should bring comfortable **skirts** or **dresses**. Acceptable dress for church or church related activities is skirts or dresses. Preachers occasionally wear ties but in general dress is casual. More typical "tourist" style dress is acceptable in the cities and on safaris but conservative, modest dress is always appreciated by the local citizens.
- Two pairs of comfortable shoes.
- Easy to care for **clothes** as the laundry will all be done by hired personnel. Please mark all your clothes, including underwear, with your name or initials on them. Clothes from various travelers will be comingled for purposes of washing. If you do not mark your clothes, it creates a big sorting problem. Do not bring any clothing you are not willing to part with.
- **Luggage:** When leaving the U.S., most airlines allow a person to check two **suitcases** weighing 50 pounds each at no added cost. *Please verify baggage details for both checked and carry-on luggage allowance with your airline; there may be exceptions and rules change frequently.*
 - **Remember to mark your luggage** with your name inside and out. Be sure to make a list of the contents of each piece of luggage in case they are lost. Weigh your suitcases before leaving for the airport.
- Credit cards and debit cards may be used with some businesses in town but credit card companies usually charge a foreign transaction fee. If you plan to use your credit card, call the credit card company before leaving the USA to let them know you will be in Africa.
- It is best to bring your needed cash in U.S. \$20, \$50 bills or \$100 bills. You will get your best exchange rate if your bills are year 2000 or newer currency. Check the dates on your bills carefully in order to save money. Traveler's checks can be cashed in various locations; however, the rate of exchange is normally 3% to 5% less than cash. The U.S. Embassy advises that Americans should not use ATM's in Tanzania. If you do, use an international bank as they are usually safe. Funds can be wire transferred into Tanzania if you should have an emergency situation arise but there is a substantial fee.
- Bring any **recharging cords or extra batteries** for phones/cameras. Tanzanians may take offense to being photographed without first giving their permission.
- Each person should bring a good pair of **sunglasses**, **mosquito repellant** lotion or spray, a **hat** and **sunscreen** especially important for any individuals at risk for skin cancer. Also, if you wear **prescription glasses** it would be wise to bring an extra pair.
- If you choose to bring a **pocketknife**, be sure it's in your checked luggage.

- A few small packages of **Kleenex tissues** would be nice to have.
- It would be good to bring a **small note pad and pen**, along with a journal to record events and places you visit, as well as the names of people you meet.

Electronics

The electricity in Tanzania is **220 volts**, and the wall socket configuration is different from the USA. It is more convenient if you can "survive" without electronic appliances because of the voltage differences. If you do bring along a blow dryer/curling iron/shaver or whatever, be certain to also bring a step-down transformer suitable for Africa.

Most laptops will accept 220 current but be sure to check your specifications. You will still need a universal adapter that can plug into a foreign wall socket to allow an American style plug. Internet cafes are available, or you can use your laptop at wi-fi points. If you want to bring a cell phone and change out the SIM card upon arrival, you can purchase a card in Tanzania at a low cost.

Stay Healthy

- Do not eat anything unless it has been cooked or peeled. Be cautious with milk products.
- Bottled water is available. Do not use tap water or ground water for drinking or brushing your teeth unless it has been boiled for 5 minutes.
- Sleep under a mosquito net when possible.
- Always wear shoes when outdoors.
- Avoid swimming in streams and lakes unless they are known to be "safe" from infectious parasites.
- Take malaria prophylaxis unless there is a medical contraindication.
- Use a flashlight at night in rural areas to avoid an occasional snake.
- Use sunscreen to avoid sunburn and ultraviolet exposure.
- Wear a seat belt when traveling on the highways.

BEFORE YOU GO

No immunizations are required before entering Tanzania, but the following are recommended
by many health authorities. Consult the Center for Disease Control website regarding advisories
for Tanzanian pre-travel immunizations. Consult the U.S. State Department website for any
travel advisories.

Typhoid

Yellow Fever (now considered a lifetime immunization)

Tetanus toxoid (if no buster within the last 5 years)

Hepatitis A

Hepatitis B (especially for health care providers)

Oral medication for prevention of malaria (Mefloquine or others)

Vaccinations

Vaccines for disease	Recommendations
Routine vaccines	Make sure you are up-to-date on all routine vaccines before every trip. Some of these vaccines include
COVID-19	All eligible travelers should be up to date with their COVID-19 vaccines. Please see <u>Your COVID-19 Vaccination</u> for more information.
Cholera	Vaccination may be considered for children and adults who are traveling to areas of active cholera transmission. Areas of active cholera transmission are <u>localized</u> to Kigoma (last case reported May 2022) and Katavi (last case reported July 2022) in Tanzania. Cholera is rare in travelers but can be severe. <u>Certain factors</u> may increase the risk of getting cholera or having severe disease (<u>more information</u>). Avoiding unsafe food and water and washing your hands can also help prevent cholera.
Hepatitis A	Recommended for unvaccinated travelers one year old or older going to Tanzania.
Hepatitis B	Recommended for unvaccinated travelers younger than 60 years old traveling to Tanzania. Unvaccinated travelers 60 years and older may get vaccinated before traveling to Tanzania.
<u>Malaria</u>	CDC recommends that travelers going to certain areas of Tanzania take prescription medicine to prevent malaria. Depending on the medicine you take, you will need to start taking this medicine multiple days before your trip, as well as during and after your trip. Talk to your doctor about which malaria medication you should take. Find country-specific information about malaria.
Rabies	Consider rabies vaccination before your trip if your activities mean you will be around dogs or wildlife.
Typhoid	Recommended for most travelers, especially those staying with friends or relatives or visiting smaller cities or rural areas.
<u>Yellow</u> <u>Fever</u>	Required if traveling from a country with risk of YF virus transmission and ≥1 year of age, including transit > 12 hours in an airport located in a country with risk of YF virus transmission.¹ Generally not recommended for travelers to Tanzania.

Packing Suggestions for Arusha, Tanzania

Baggage Allowance: Going – maximum 2 bags of 50 lb. each going

- Bible
- Passport
- Extra passport photos
- Photocopy of your birth certificate
- Shot records
- Money/traveler's checks/credit or debit cards
- Journal, if desired.
- Camera and extra batteries if desired
- Towel-1, not too thick and washcloth if you need it
- Guys: Long pants (like bush pants, with pockets). T- shirts or button-down-the-front shirts. A three-button or button-down-the-front for Sunday.
- Girls: Dresses, skirts and blouses, or jumpers; not form-fitting and well below the knee. All blouses should have at least cap sleeves.
- Game park clothes (long shorts or whatever you're comfortable in on a dusty, daring day off!)
- Flipflops or waterproof sandals
- Comfortable, sturdy walking shoes for hilly, rocky terrain. An extra pair can be useful in case one pair gets wet.
- Light jacket (warm during day and cool at night)
- Clothing for cool and warm weather. Remember, no central air or heat. Days may be warm to hot. Nights are generally cool. (Some warm socks and a sweatshirt usually take care of this.
- Rain poncho (optional)
- Cap/hat
- Flashlight/extra batteries
- Bug spray
- Suntan lotion
- Sunglasses
- Snacks, gum
- Toiletries (Extra shampoo, deodorant, soap, toothpaste can be bought there.)
- Waterless hand cleanser and/or wet ones type product. (Water is not always available.)
- Girls: Bring your preferred skin care products, personal hygiene products. Makeup should be extremely minimal (OR NONE).
- Girls: You may wear small, simple earrings. No expensive jewelry.
- Bring all contact lens supplies with you- often not available or very costly.
- Cards/games
- Any prescription meds you take regularly.
- Over the counter meds you take on a regular basis, i.e., Tylenol, Benadryl cream, Ibuprofen.
- A list of those you want/need to buy gifts for.
- Addresses, including e-mail, of anyone you might want to contact.
- Everyone should include 1-2 changes of clothes in their carry-on luggage in case suitcases get lost, with meds, contacts, glasses and such in it.
- All knives must be in checked luggage.
- Any items that might leak, such as shampoo, are best sealed in Ziplocs to prevent accidents.
- A loving heart, lots of flexibility and patience, an adventuresome spirit, and the desire to share God and Christ with others!

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF MEDICAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENT & RELEASE

I understand and acknowledge that an absolute prerequisite of my being allowed to participate in the Arusha, Tanzania Mission Trip is that I must have in force prior to departure and keep in force for the duration of the trip, a medical insurance policy that will be honored in the country/countries to which and/or through which the trip will be made.

I understand and acknowledge as an absolute pre-requisite to my participation in the Tanzania Mission Trip that I must both affirmatively represent (and I do so represent by signing below) that I have secured such medical insurance coverage or will secure such coverage **AND** that I must present written proof of such coverage to Dr. Richard Trull, Jr. at whatever time prior to departure he requires it. I understand and agree that failure to comply with these requirements will result in my not being allowed to make the trip and that I will not be entitled to any refunds of any funds previously deposited toward making the trip.

I understand and acknowledge that I must have in my possession at all times during the trip whatever proof of insurance is required for the rendition of medical services in the country/countries to which and/or through which the trip will be made.

I understand and acknowledge that neither Faulkner University nor any of its representatives in their individual capacities will be in any way responsible for covering my medical bills, including copayments and deductibles, if I require medical services on the trip. I further understand that no representative of Faulkner University on the Tanzania Mission Trip has the power to obligate Faulkner University to be in any way responsible for my medical bills, including co-payments and deductibles, if I require medical services on the trip; only Dr. Mitch Henry, President of Faulkner University can so obligate the University.

I understand and agree that neither Dr. Trull's acceptance of my representation that I have the aforementioned medical insurance coverage nor Dr. Trull's acceptance of my submitted written proof of such coverage will in any way operate to make Faulkner University or Dr. Richard Trull, Jr. or any other Faulkner representative responsible for any medical services I require on the trip in the event that my medical insurer does not cover expenses for the services I require.
