Kay Ivey Governor, State of Alabama



Governor Kay Ivey Growing up in the small town of Camden in Wilcox County, Alabama, and working on her father's farm, Kay Ivey was taught the value of hard work and living within one's means. Her parents instilled the Alabama values of faith, family and community.

After graduating from Auburn University in 1967, Kay worked as a high school teacher and a bank officer. She served as Reading Clerk of the Alabama House of Representatives under Speaker Joseph C. McCorquodale and was Assistant Director of the Alabama Development Office, where she worked to spur job creation and economic development across the state.

In 2002, Kay became the first Republican elected State Treasurer since Reconstruction, and she was re-elected in 2006. As Treasurer, Kay was committed to making the

office more open, transparent, and efficient. Kay was elected Lieutenant Governor in 2010, becoming the first Republican woman to hold the office in Alabama's history.

She again made history on November 4, 2014, by becoming the first Republican Lieutenant Governor re-elected to the office.

Governor Ivey has been honored to receive numerous awards for her service to the state of Alabama, including the 2015 ALFA Service to Agriculture Award; Newsmax's 50 Most Influential Female Republicans in the country; the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) 2016 Public Service Award; and 2017 Citizen of the Year, by River Region Living Magazine. In September 2019, the Alabama-Florida Council of the Boy Scouts of America distinguished Governor Ivey as a Golden Eagle for her 'scout like service' and being a trailblazer for women. In 2021, Governor Ivey was awarded the prestigious Army Aviation Order of St. Michael Knight Award. The American Village also presented the governor their highest honor, the Cornerstone of Liberty Award. Most recently, Governor Ivey was presented the inaugural Cognia STEM Champion Award and the Alabama Automotive Manufacturers Association Hall of Fame Award.

On April 10, 2017, Governor Ivey was sworn in as the 54th Governor of the state of Alabama in the Old Senate Chamber in the Alabama State Capitol by Acting Chief Justice Lyn Stuart. Following a successful nineteen months in office, the people of Alabama made history again in November 2018 by electing Governor Ivey to a full term. She is the first Lieutenant Governor of Alabama elected to a full term after taking over as governor due to a vacancy in the Governor's Office.

On January 14, 2019, Governor Ivey was officially sworn in for her full term by Associate Justice Will Sellers. Governor Ivey's first term brought conservative leadership with effective results to make this generation more productive and the next generation more prosperous.

Governor Ivey was reelected to a second full term November 2022 in a landslide voting outcome, and she was sworn in January 16, 2023. Noting education, economic development, roads and bridges, broadband expansion, public safety and government reform as the top priorities of her second administration, Governor Ivey vowed to keep Alabama working, ensuring the state's best days are yet to come.

She is a member of the First Baptist Church of Montgomery, the Montgomery Rotary Club and the Board of Directors of the Montgomery YMCA. Governor Ivey is also the first Girls State alumnus to be elected to an Alabama Constitutional Office.

Fred D. Gray Attorney



A native of Montgomery, Alabama, Fred D. Gray currently lives in Tuskegee, Alabama, and is a civil rights lawyer. He was educated at the Nashville Christian Institute, Nashville, Tennessee; Alabama State University, Montgomery, Alabama; and Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.

An admittee of the Alabama and Ohio Bars, Gray is admitted to practice in the following courts: Supreme Court of Ohio, 1954; Supreme Court of Alabama, 1954; U. S. District Court for the Middle District of Alabama, 1955; Supreme Court of the United States, 1956; U.S. Court of appeals for Fifth Circuit, 1958; U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Alabama, 1963; U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, 1968; U. S. Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, 1982; Tax Court, 1968.

Gray's legal career spans a time period of over 50 years. Enthusiastic, energetic and out of law school less than a year, he began a dynamic civil rights career in 1954. In 1955 he

represented Mrs. Rosa Parks who was arrested because she refused to give up her seat on a bus to a white man, which ignited the Montgomery Bus Boycott. City of Montgomery v. Rosa Parks. He was Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s first civil rights attorney.

The list of Gray's civil rights cases that he won can be found in most constitutional law textbooks. One of the first African Americans to serve in the Alabama Legislature since reconstruction, he served from 1970-1974. He received the Capitol Press Corps Award for Best Orator in the House of Representatives in 1972, and was a member of the National Society of State Legislators from 1970-1974.

His love and commitment in promoting the works of the National Bar Association gave him recognition as its 43rd President, 1985-86. He initiated the NBA Hall of Fame (becoming an inductee in August of 1995), and was the recipient of the Charles Hamilton Houston Medallion of Merit from the Washington Bar Association. He currently serves or has served as a member of a number of distinguished boards. He is the recipient of numerous awards and honors. He is the senior partner in the law firm of Gray, Langford, Sapp, McGowan, Gray, Gray & Nathanson, P.C. with offices in Montgomery and Tuskegee, Alabama. Gray and his wife, Carol, reside in Tuskegee, Alabama.

As a child, Fred Gray's family attended Montgomery's Holt Street Church of Christ. Gray attended the Nashville Christian Institute, a boarding school operated by Churches of Christ for African Americans, were he was chosen to serve as one of the "boy preachers" by NCI president, Marshall Keeble. After graduating from NCI, he returned to Montgomery and served as a part time minister with several churches in the community, including Titus, LaGrande, Brundidge, and Lanett. He continued his ministry work while attending law school at Western Reserve University in Cleveland by serving as the assistant minister of Street Church of Christ (now University Church of Christ). In 1957 he agreed to serve as the full-time preacher for Newtown Church of Christ in Montgomery, where he continued to serve for 16 years. In 1973 he became the minister of the Tuskegee Institute Church of Christ, where he helped organize the merger to desegregate two of the city's Churches of Christ to form the Tuskegee Church of Christ. Gray has taught and baptized hundreds of people during his time in ministry. He has served as a member of the Board of Trustees for Southwestern Christian College (Terrell, TX) and Faulkner University.

CORDS:

Black and gold cord denote membership in *Chi Alpha Sigma*, a National College Athlete honor society.
Red and white cords denote membership in *Phi Alpha Theta*, a National History Honor Society.
Blue and white cords identify Graduate Counseling students with a 3.7 GPA or higher.
Gold cord identifies those graduating with honors. In the traditional program, honors are announced in increasing levels of honor as *cum laude, magna cum laude*, and *summa cum laude*.
Green and purple cord denotes membership in *Kappa Delta Pi*, an international Education honor society.
Orange and white cords denote membership in the National Student Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

Platinum and dark blue cord denotes membership in *Psi Chi*, an international Psychology honor society. **Black and platinum cords** denote membership in the National Society of Leadership and Success. **Red cord** denotes membership in the Aspiring Educators Program.

LAPEL PIN:

Black and gold pin with Faulkner emblem denotes recipient of the Lou Harris Criminal Justice Honor Graduate Award.

MEDALLIONS:

Blue and gold medallion on blue ribbon denotes membership in *Alpha Iota Sigma*, an Interdisciplinary Studies honor society.

Blue and gold medallion on gold ribbon denotes membership in *Sigma Zeta*, a national honor society for Mathematics, Computer Science, and Science majors.

Gold medallion on blue and green ribbon denotes membership in Alpha Chi, a national honor society.

Red and black medallion on red and black ribbon denotes membership in the National Society of Leadership and Success.

Silver medallion on blue ribbon identifies honorees of Faulkner's academic departments.

STOLES:

Blue stole with white trim denotes successful graduation in Faulkner's Great Books Honors program. Purple stole with white trim denotes membership in *Lambda Epsilon Chi*, a national Paralegal honor society. Silver stole with Greek letters $K\Delta\Pi$ in black denotes membership in *Kappa Delta Pi*, an international Education honor society.

Platinum stole with Greek letters $\Sigma A\Pi$ denotes membership in The National Society of Leadership and Success.

Academic Regalia

The Cap and Gown The academic cap signifies the freedom of scholarship and the responsibility and dignity scholarship endows the wearer. Old poetry refers to the cap as square, symbolizing a book. From medieval times, academic robes have most often been black.


